



Salute to Summer Festival a Resounding Success

Summer kicked off in grand fashion Memorial Day weekend with the City's annual festival, rebranded this year as Salute to Summer!

The first-ever Hometown Heroes Event at City Hall was held on Thursday evening, where La Vista's new Blue Star Memorial was unveiled and dedicated. Dignitaries, veterans and families attended this event, which was designed to honor those who have served our nation in the military and those who have given the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom.

Thousands of people enjoyed the Community Cookout on Friday evening, sponsored by the La Vista Community Foundation, and the fireworks display, provided by Bellino Fireworks. Central Park was filled to the brim all weekend with people who took in the carnival and vendors.

This year's parade grand marshal was the family of U.S. Army Captain Joel E. Cahill who was killed in action in Iraq in 2005. Larry and Barbara Cahill, who are longtime La Vista residents, represented the family.

Leah Hoins, Executive Director of the La Vista Community Foundation, was named Friend of La Vista. Leah is a champion for the community and her excitement and enthusiasm are contagious to all she meets. Mayor Kindig presented a special award to Leah at the Mayor's Lunch prior to the parade.

The Salute to Summer Festival would not be possible without the generous contributions of the La Vista Community Foundation, Bellino Fireworks and La Vista Keno.

"The support of these organizations is absolutely essential to making the City's annual festival the success it has been year in and year out," said Mayor Douglas Kindig. "To these organizations, as well as our other partners, thank you so much for supporting the La Vista community."

In addition to the Salute to Summer Festival, a full slate of other fun activities has been offered in La Vista this summer and continues in August with a third movie and concert night, National Night Out activities and an Urban Scramble Adventure Race.

Progress Continues on Acquisition of Brentwood Crossing Property

Even though noticeable changes are not yet evident along 84th Street, the City continues to focus on the redevelopment of this corridor.

The City has authorized Midwest Right of Way to negotiate on the City's behalf with the landowner of Brentwood Crossing (the site of the former Walmart) regarding the acquisition of this property.

This is a time-consuming process involving multiple legal steps when a city proposes to acquire private property; however the City is working hard to get this accomplished.

Additionally, City officials continue to try to spur interest from potential developers regarding this property with the ultimate goal of seeing the ideas outlined in the Vision 84 plan become a reality.

We will continue to provide more details as progress is made on this very important project.



Prior 84th Street actions include:

- February 2012 - 84th Street Redevelopment Area is declared substandard and blighted and in need of redevelopment. An ordinance was also adopted creating the La Vista Community Development Agency, governed by the Mayor and City Council.
- July 2013 - Redevelopment Plan is approved for the 84th Street Redevelopment Area, including the first phase project, Brentwood Crossing.
- August 2013 - the Community Development Agency declares the necessity of acquiring the property.
- December 2013 - public hearing is held on the proposed acquisition of Brentwood Crossing and notices were published and mailed to the property owner and tenants.
- May 2014 - voters authorized an additional ½ cent local option sales tax to fund projects related to the redevelopment of 84th Street. The City has been collecting this tax since October 2014.

Remembering Our Fallen Exhibit Coming to La Vista in September

The La Vista Public Library will host a special military exhibit this fall.

The Remembering Our Fallen exhibit will be at the Library September 9-17 in Room 138. The exhibit will be open Monday-Thursday, 8 a.m.-9 p.m.; Friday and Saturday 8 a.m.-5 p.m. and Sunday 1-15 p.m.

The exhibit was created in 2010 by Bill and Evronne Williams of Omaha after reading a story about a father whose pain and grief were even greater four years after son had died in Iraq, because he felt his son had been forgotten.

The exhibit includes photos of soldiers who have been killed in action in The War on Terror since September 11, 2001. The Williams have created exhibits for 22 states so far. The Nebraska version features photos of soldiers who called Nebraska home at the time of their death. The exhibit travels each week to a new location in Nebraska.

"It is our eternal hope to honor the memory



of those who have made the ultimate sacrifice, to provide comfort to friends and family of the fallen and to remind others of the tremendous cost paid by some," the Williams say on their website. "Its legacy will be that these men and women will never be forgotten and that their names will be remembered and spoken."

The costs to bring the exhibit to La Vista

are being sponsored by the La Vista Community Foundation.

An opening reception will be held on Tuesday, September 8, beginning at 6:30 p.m. at the Library. The event will include patriotic music, special speakers and a reading of each name represented in the exhibit.

Used Tire Collection

The City will be hosting a used tire collection event the week of August 17-22. Used tires can be dropped off at the Public Works Facility located at 9900 Portal Road.

Drop-off times are August 17-21, 7:30 a.m.-3 p.m. and August 22, 8 a.m.-3 p.m.

This project is made possible by a grant received from the Sarpy/Cass Health Department for West Nile Virus Prevention. Used tires left outside collect water and become prime breeding sites for mosquitoes. The used tires are collected and then sent to a recycling company for shredding.

In addition to used tires, used motor oil, anti-freeze and any type of batteries will be accepted. The event is open to all residents and those living in the City's

Extra-Territorial Jurisdiction. Proof of residency will be required; photo ID or a utility bill.

Fall Leaf Collection

The City's annual fall leaf collection will take place Saturday, November 7, 8 a.m.-3 p.m. at the Public Works Facility, 9900 Portal Road. The service is available to residents and those living in the City's Extra-Territorial Jurisdiction.

In addition, a dumpster will be available for yard waste disposal Monday through Friday, October 13-November 6, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Public Works Facility.

Leaves and grass clippings will be accepted along with tree branches, which can be any length but no larger than 6 inches in

diameter. Used motor oil, anti-freeze and all batteries will also be accepted. Citizens must have proof of residency, either a valid driver's license or a copy of a utility bill.

Residential Sewer Drain Cleaning

When you have your home sewer line cleaned, notify the Public Works Department at 402-331-8927.

Material removed from your sewer line is forced into the main sewer line, which creates the possibility of it becoming stuck in the main and causing backup problems. When you notify Public Works, staff will check and service the main sewer for proper flow.




2nd Annual BioBlitz Event Scheduled for October 3

La Vista's second annual BioBlitz event, designed to encourage families to explore and experience nature up close and personal, is scheduled for 10 a.m.-3 p.m., Saturday, October 3, in Central Park, located a half-mile north of Giles Road near La Vista Junior High.

With Thompson Creek as the backdrop, the event will feature booths, demonstrations, and hands-on activities. The reconstruction of the Thompson Creek Channel from Edgewood to 72nd should be substantially complete by then.

Guided tours of the creek will also be given with explanations of the storm water management efforts incorporated into the reconstruction. An ongoing objective of the BioBlitz event is to inform residents of the need to better manage storm water runoff and encourage sustainable living through actions that each property owner can undertake.





Building a Vision for La Vista

Look Out La Vista, the update to the City's comprehensive plan, continues to get great feedback from residents.

In April, the City of La Vista invited Peter Kageyama, author of *For the Love of Cities* and *Love Where You Live*, to speak to the community.

Residents, city employees, the business community, and students attended three sessions wherein Peter discussed how people love their cities throughout the United States and what paths we in La Vista can take to find the same emotional engagement.

He aimed his message not only at residents, but city staff and council



members, encouraging them to embrace new ideas, even the more unusual ones.

Examples of quirky community building helped reinforce this suggestion; like the Mice on Main from Greenville, South Carolina. In 2000, a student asked for funding to install nine bronze mouse sculptures along Main Street as part of a school project. Since then,

the mice have become part of Greenville's cultural identity, giving visitors and residents an emotional attachment to that place.

Peter encouraged La Vista to embrace the temporary and to "not let being perfect prevent us from being good." Using an anecdote about another city's inability to install a splash park, he expressed the importance of recognizing the impact of simple solutions.

Kids will have fun with water from any source, and for a small town in Connecticut, a garden hose filled in just fine when a larger, more permanent structure was not in the budget.



Building a Vision for La Vista continued

Over the course of the Salute to Summer Festival, an estimated 400 to 500 people stopped by the Look Out La Vista booth. The project team received nearly 250 written comments on what they love about La Vista, and what they would change about La Vista.

Many people mentioned the love of La Vista's small town feel, the great parks, and the schools. Redeveloping 84th street was the most popular change that residents saw in the future.

An additional visioning event was held in Central Park on Saturday, June 27. "Taste of La Vista" offered citizens sample food and drink from local vendors while helping to build

a community vision for La Vista.

There were activities for children and adults, including a photo booth, designing your own vision building block, and mapping your opportunities. Trends of how La Vista has grown recently, and how La Vista stacks up regionally were presented. Those in attendance responded to whether those trends should be encouraged or if we need to change the trajectory of the community.

All input received from stakeholder interviews in April, workshops with the renowned author and speaker Peter Kageyama, the online visioning survey, Salute to Summer Festival, and the Taste of La Vista will

be compiled into a consolidated Vision Document.

This will be available online later this summer and ultimately integrated into the final Comprehensive Plan.

A second set of workshops will be held this fall to discuss specific community opportunities and make choices about how to achieve the community vision. At these events, residents will learn about citywide plan modifications, and the trade-offs and benefits of specific choices.

A secondary online questionnaire will accompany these opportunities workshops, for those who cannot attend the meetings.
