City Exploring Feasibility of New Swimming Pool in Central Park

La Vista's swimming pool was built in the early 1960s and is nearing the end of its useful life. Over the years, the City has made safety improvements and functional and cosmetic repairs to prolong its life. The City also brought forth two ballot initiatives to fund a new pool in its current location that were narrowly defeated in 2008 and 2012.

Despite the ballot results, surveys of residents have consistently shown the desire for a public swimming pool in La Vista, leading the City to seek alternative solutions.

In 2014, the City was approached by a nonprofit corporation regarding the potential of a new community pool as a component of a state-of-the-art championship athletic complex to be developed northeast of Giles Road and Eastport Parkway. The City worked with the nonprofit to pursue this opportunity to the extent possible; however, the project has not materialized as planned.

In its current location, the swimming pool has become an obstacle to the timely construction of a pedestrian underpass, which is a core component of the Vision 84 plan envisioned to connect the east and west sides of 84th Street providing safe passage.

The age, condition and location of the

swimming pool have made it necessary to explore other options. Central Park has emerged as a strong possibility for a new pool because of its scenic and central location.

The City hosted a public open house in October to gather feedback on the potential project and types of amenities residents are looking for. A second public

open house will be held on **Wednesday, November 20, 7-8:30 p.m.** at the La Vista Community Center (8116 Park View Blvd.) to view and comment on the conceptual designs and ask questions of staff and consultants.



A MINUTE WITH mayor kindig

You may have noticed on the front-page teaser that La Vista will turn 60 this coming February. As I think about how the community has evolved over the years, I am amazed by what we have to show for 60 short years. I am also reminded that we must face new challenges that go along with aging, especially when it comes to our public infrastructure.

La Vista is a dynamic community that has experienced tremendous growth over the past two decades. With that



growth comes a demand for increased community resources, public infrastructure and additional staff.

Something I've heard from many of you over the past year is a desire to improve the overall condition of our neighborhood streets. I want you to know that we are listening. We will be working on a multi-year plan to assess, prioritize and identify funding for necessary maintenance, repairs and replacement.

To help ensure the continued fiscal strength necessary to meet these demands, the City Council recently passed a 1.5% restaurant tax. While businesses that provide food and beverages are vital to our overall economy, and we welcome the visitors they bring, they do have an impact on City services. The restaurant tax is a way to share the burden equally with non-residents.

Finally, we are exploring the feasibility of a new community swimming pool in Central Park. As stated in the article on page 1, the pool is nearing the end of its useful life and has become an impediment to our continued progress in implementing the Vision 84 plan, specifically, as it relates to the planned pedestrian underpass, which will connect the east and west sides of 84th Street to provide safe passage.

While we have a great deal going on, I want you to know the City Council and I are working diligently to ensure that the City's continued progress is fiscally prudent and sustainable.

City Engineer John Kottmann Retires

Since the early 1980s, only one man has had a seat at the table for every major project in La Vista.

His trademark cowboy boots and customary humble, no-nonsense approach have accompanied decades of sound engineering counsel, advice and plans of action for the City.

That man, City Engineer John Kottmann, officially retired in October after nearly 40 years of service to this community.

Kottmann worked for nearly 30 years with the engineering firm Thompson, Dreessen and Dorner, now known as TD2. While at the firm, he served as La Vista's City Engineer, a position appointed by the Mayor.

In April 2010, Kottmann came to work full-time for the City serving as both the City Engineer, as well as the Assistant Public Works Director.

Kottmann's first interaction with La Vista was in 1982 when he was asked to deliver something to the City's sewer plant along the Papio Creek.

"And that's down where?" Kottmann recalls thinking. "At the time 84th Street was the only way to get to La Vista."

Eventually Kottmann was asked to be La Vista's main point of contact at the firm.

"I stuck like glue, hopefully for the best," he said.

Kottmann is the resident expert on Thompson Creek, having worked for decades on various solutions to flooding and erosion along the channel, including

a flood control dry dam project on the site where La Vista Falls Golf Course was built and where Civic Center Park is now located.

"We spent probably two years trying to get the funding for it," Kottmann said.

When it became necessary for complete repair of the channel, Kottmann served as the City's project manager, overseeing the voluntary buyout and removal of homes and extensive construction.

While the City's 84th Street redevelopment project has consumed much of his time in

recent years, he's most proud of a project several years ago involving the repair of Giles Road. The project involved an approach that repaired the surface before it was beyond repair, saving the City a costly project in the future.

"The sheer benefit for the investment I think was pretty good," he said.

So, after nearly 40 years in service to La Vista, Kottmann said he'll miss one thing.

"The people."

The people will certainly miss John as well.

City Council Adopts Restaurants & Drinking Places Tax

The City of La Vista has made progress in economic development and redevelopment which has brought many more visitors to La Vista in recent years. One of the impacts of this success is an increased demand on City resources, such as public infrastructure and public safety personnel.

In order to ensure the continued strength of the City's finances and maintain quality services expected by residents, the City Council recently approved a 1.5 percent Restaurants & Drinking Places Occupation

Tax, which took effect on October 1.

From this tax, the City estimates it will collect approximately \$700,000 each year to offset additional service costs related to growth.

Businesses affected by this change will include cafes, bakeries, coffee shops, food trucks, caterers, and restaurants or drinking places in grocery and convenience stores.

Though this tax is levied on businesses, those businesses may choose to pass along the cost to their customers. If they chose to do so, businesses must itemize


the additional tax on customers' receipts.

Below is an example of how that might impact a La Vista diner:

Meal	\$50
Occupation Tax (1.5%)	+75 cents
Total cost of meal	\$50.75
7.5% sales tax (State 5.5% + City 2%)	+\$3.81
Total cost to the customer	\$54.56

The Security Camera Registration Program (SCRAM) is designed to help deter criminal activity throughout the community and assist in investigations.

When a crime occurs, officers and detectives will reach out to the owners of registered surveillance systems in the area. They will request to review surveillance footage and collect video or photo evidence.



Library Adds Self Check-Out Machine

The Library recently added a new piece of technology to the equipment it offers to the public.

A self check-out machine is now available for patrons to use after they have selected the materials they want to borrow from the Library.

This machine is ADA accessible and will be useful for times when there are lines at the circulation desk. The machine will also maintain confidentiality for patrons who need to check out materials on personal topics such as medical conditions.

The process to use the machine is simple:

- Swipe the library card
- Scan material to be checked out

Each patron will receive a receipt summarizing their transaction and the due date(s) for their materials.

The self check-out machine will be available during regular business hours: Monday-Thursday, 8 a.m.-9 p.m.; Friday and Saturday 8 a.m.-5 p.m. and Sunday 1-5 p.m.



The resurfacing of Park View Boulevard was completed this summer.

Crews Complete Resurfacing of 84th St., Park View Blvd.

Two major thoroughfares in La Vista were resurfaced this spring and summer completing much needed repairs to those frequently traveled roads.

Southbound 84th Street was the first portion to be completed, followed by Park View Boulevard and then northbound 84th Street this fall.

The two legs of 84th Street were originally scheduled to be resurfaced at the same time and not until the new City Centre Drive intersection was installed, but the conditions of the southbound lanes made it necessary to make those repairs earlier than originally planned.

Before the resurfacing could be completed, Public Works crews worked to keep the streets open and as passable as possible given the available materials and weather conditions.

Christmas Tree Recycling Sites Open through January 18

The City of La Vista will be once again offering free drop-off sites for Christmas trees at the following locations:

- La Vista Soccer Complex parking lot (two blocks south of Harrison St. on 66th St.)
- Kelly West Parking Lot (87th St. and Park View Blvd.)

Drop-off sites will be open December 26 to January 19.

All decorations, tinsel and plastic bags must be removed prior to disposal. The collected trees will be chipped into mulch, which is available to residents free of charge.

Winter Season Reminders

Snowy weather will soon be here and the Public Works Department has a couple of reminders regarding clearing snow from streets and sidewalks.

Snow Emergency


When a snow emergency is declared, local media outlets (radio and newspaper) will be notified and notice will be posted on the City's social media accounts and website at CityofLaVista.org.

Citizens are required to keep all vehicles off the street after a snowstorm (at least 2 inches of accumulation) or after a declared

snow emergency for 24 hours, or until the street has been plowed. Even if the vehicle was already parked on the street before the storm, it must be moved off the street for 24 hours after the storm ends or until the snow plows clear the street.

Clearing Sidewalks

In all residential neighborhoods, sidewalks must be clear within 24 hours after precipitation ends. In all business districts, the property and public sidewalks must be clear within five hours of the end of the storm, or by 8:30 a.m. the next morning.



Council Clips






