



Highlights of recent City Council action.


- Approved an application to the Economic Development Program from the Nebraska Multisport Complex.

CORRIDOR 84 UPDATE

La Vista City Centre will continue to be a hub of construction activity as several new projects, both public and private, are now underway. For more information on any 84th Street project, visit Corridor84.com.

PUBLIC PROJECTS

THE LINK. The City will be constructing public gathering spaces and facilities in Central Park adjacent to The Astro music venue. This area, to be called The Link, will include public restrooms, concessions, boardwalks, plaza space, access paths, stairs and ramps leading from the park, as well as from 84th Street to City Centre. Construction on this project will begin soon with completion planned for late spring 2023. A rendering is shown to the right.



CHILI'S NEW LOCATION. Construction of the new Chili's restaurant is nearly complete, which will allow for the demolition of the existing building. Demolition will begin just as soon as the building is vacant and can be completed within a few weeks.



PUBLIC PARKING GARAGE #2.

In order to provide for the safe circulation of increased traffic from additional private development within City Centre, the City has started construction on a second public garage. This garage will provide nearly 500 stalls and will be located along 84th Street where the current Chili's restaurant is situated. Completion for this parking garage is planned for summer 2023.



PRIVATE PROJECTS

THE ASTRO MUSIC VENUE. Three private partners—City Ventures, One Percent Productions and Mammoth, Inc.—are building and will operate The Astro music venue: a 2,500-person, 52,000-square-foot indoor theater and 5,000-person outdoor amphitheater. A groundbreaking ceremony was held in late September and completion is planned for spring 2023.



BUILDING 10. Construction is nearing completion on the exterior of building 10, which is located along Main Street across from Vivere South. This two-story-mixed-use commercial building will be the home to restaurants, retail and office space.

THANK YOU, IBEW LOCAL 22

Several local businesses recently contributed to the purchase of Stop the Bleed kits for the Papillion Fire Department. **The kits are designed to be dropped off at a triage zone at a mass casualty event such as mass shootings, crashes, tornados or other disasters such as explosions.**

With the donations from Talacko Safety Solutions, CHI, Nebraska Medicine and Rotella's Italian Bakery, the fire department will place a kit in each fire truck and ambulance, as well as the Battalion Chief's SUV.

Fire Chief Bill Bowes hosted a press conference recently to recognize the local companies for their contributions.

The youth council was asked to help write thank you notes to local veterans in conjunction with the La Vista Community Foundation's Salute to Veterans event in November.

Ten leadership council members recruited friends and wrote hundreds of thank you notes, which were included with the meals provided to veterans living in La Vista and surrounding communities.

SPREADING THE WARMTH & LENDING A HELPING HAND

The City's annual coat and food drives at the end of 2021 were huge successes, due to the generosity of our community!

The City partnered with the Papillion La Vista Community Schools Community Closet for our **Spread the Warmth Coat Drive** to distribute coats, accessories and hygiene products to 230 local families.

In recognition of the school district's partnership for this important effort, Mayor Kindig presented a proclamation to Becky Meyers, Director of Elementary Student Services.

The **Helping Hands Food Drive** kicked off in November and ran through the end of December. It yielded approximately 700 pounds of donations—enough to fill two pick-up trucks! All donations went to the Tri-City Food Pantry, which serves families in Sarpy County and Ralston.



TIPS FOR STAYING ACTIVE IN COLD WEATHER

When winter blows in, you can pull the blankets over your head and go back to sleep—or you can suit up and head out for an outdoor winter adventure! The American Heart Association offers these tips for working out in the cold of winter.

STAY WARM, STAY SAFE

Staying warm and dry when heading out to exercise in cold weather is all about layers. A little preparation can keep you safe from cold weather hazards like hypothermia and frostbite.

Cold temperatures, strong winds and damp conditions (like rain and snow) steal your body heat. For example, according to the National Weather Service, a 30-degree day with 30-mile-an-hour wind feels like about 15 degrees. And if you get wet (from rain, snow, or perspiration) that effect is only magnified. That's why layers of clothing are so important. They help trap the heat and form a kind of insulation against the elements.

Resist your instinct to start layering with cotton. Once cotton becomes wet with sweat or snow, the moisture is trapped and will make you feel colder (and heavier). For your first layer, you want something that pulls moisture away from your skin, like the moisture wicking fabrics used in high-performance sportswear. Next, add a layer of fleece; finally, top with a thin waterproof layer.

STAY HYDRATED

Don't forget to drink water when exercising in cooler weather. Thirst isn't the best indicator that you need to drink.

KNOW THE SIGNS

Hypothermia means the body temperature has fallen below 95 degrees Fahrenheit. It occurs when your body can't produce enough energy to keep the internal body temperature warm enough. It can kill you.

Symptoms can include:

- Lack of coordination
- Mental confusion
- Slowed reactions
- Cold feet and hands
- Shivering
- Sleepiness
- Slurred speech

Children and the elderly may be at more risk because they may have limited ability to communicate or impaired mobility. Elderly people may also have lower subcutaneous fat and a diminished ability to sense temperature, so they can suffer hypothermia without knowing they're in danger.



BENEFITS OF STAYING ACTIVE IN THE WINTER

1. There is no heat and humidity to deal with. Winter's chill might even make you feel awake and invigorated.
2. It's a great way to take in the sunlight (in small doses). Not only can light improve many people's moods, but it also helps you get some vitamin D.
3. You may be able to work out longer in cold weather—which means you can burn even more calories.
4. Exercise boosts your immunity during cold and flu season. Just a few minutes a day can help prevent simple bacterial and viral infections, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

CONSTRUCTION IN CENTRAL PARK EAST ON THOMPSON CREEK

The City has been working for many years to improve water quality and reduce channel erosion along the section of Thompson Creek that runs from 72nd Street through Central Park East. Previous projects stabilized creek banks and reduced the potential for flooding from 72nd Street to Edgewood Blvd.

A project is currently underway to make similar improvements to the stretch of the creek in Central Park East.

Work began in January to widen and meander the channel. As a result, the metal picnic shelter and the restroom building near the creek have been removed, along with a number of trees. Locations for replacement of these amenities will be determined once the project is completed.

During various phases of the construction, pedestrian access to the park from Park View Blvd. will be interrupted and a portion of the sidewalk on Edgewood Blvd. near the creek will be closed. Construction is expected to be complete by fall of 2022.



EAST LA VISTA SEWER AND PAVEMENT PROJECT SLATED TO BEGIN THIS SPRING

The neighborhood east of 72nd Street and north of Thompson Creek, known as the House of Nines, will soon be a construction zone.


For several years the City has been planning the East La Vista Sewer and Pavement project, which will include replacing portions of the main sewer line, installing a liner in other sections, repairing and replacing lateral connections as needed and performing a mill and asphalt overlay of all roadways in the neighborhood.

The City is completing design of the project with bidding this spring. The project would start construction soon after that.

The project is estimated to cost approximately \$5 million and will be financed from the Sewer Reserve Fund and a loan from the State Revolving Loan Fund.

The City of La Vista hosted a public open house last fall for the residents in east La Vista to review and answer questions regarding the sewer and pavement rehabilitation project. This joint event will be located at 99th Circle and Portal Road on the south side of Portal Road, just east of the Papillion Public Works Facility. The event is open to Papillion and La Vista residents only.

DUMPING DOS & DON'TS

ACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- Household and lawn furniture
- Mattresses and box springs
- Major appliances
- Grills and smokers
- Outdoor power equipment (please empty fuel prior to disposing)
- Residential construction materials
- Automotive parts and batteries
- Undamaged propane tanks

- Broken toys and play structures
- Bicycles
- Tree limbs and yard waste (must be free of garbage and bags)
- All types of TVs (rear projection, tube TVs, flat screens, etc. may be disposed of in the roll-off dumpsters)
- CRT computer monitors (may be disposed of in the roll-off dumpsters)

ELECTRONICS

The electronic recyclers will accept the following items in the designated area of the Cleanup Days site:
