MINUTE WITH THE MAYOR

Take a look around La Vista and you will see monumental change and growth happening in our community. Construction on public projects in La Vista City Centre such as The Link and public parking garage #2 continue to move swiftly. With private developments such as the continued construction on the Nebraska MultiSport Complex and Smash Park projects in Southport, as well as The Astro in City Centre, La Vista is growing, adding amenities and businesses like we've never experienced before.

With growth comes financial opportunities and obligations. The development that generates revenue and enables our City to prosper requires funding. As a La Vista resident, you play an important role in deciding what funds are available for future development and infrastructure projects across the City. On pages 3 and 4 of this newsletter you will find information about two questions La Vista voters will see on the ballot this November that will greatly impact the direction of the City's growth. Both questions relate to existing taxes that draw revenue primarily from sources outside of the City's residents.

One of the ballot questions will ask about renewing a half-cent sales tax that is currently in place. This sales tax was originally approved in 1990 and renewed by voters in 2000 and 2008. **The approximately \$2.5 million in revenue generated annually from this tax is used for necessary upkeep and improvement of roads and sidewalks, parks, and public facilities.** If the tax were to expire, the City will have less funding available for planned capital improvements and new projects.

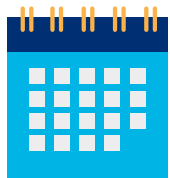
La Vista voters will also decide on an amended restaurant tax. La Vista's current 1.5% restaurant tax that was put in place in 2019 has an annual state mandated cap of \$700,000. The tax revenue generated each year has exceeded that amount. La Vista has an opportunity to remove the cap—this would help the City diversify its revenue stream and share the burden of growth associated with development with non-residents who are enjoying La Vista's amenities. Voters will decide whether to eliminate the cap and raise the tax to 2.5%, which would provide millions of dollars in revenue and help prevent the need to raise property taxes to pay for existing debts and future growth.

The majority of revenue from both the sales tax and restaurant tax is generated by visitors to the City, NOT La Vista residents. Research shows that on average, more than 90% of consumers at businesses, including restaurants, in La Vista are non-residents.

Evidence of the progress happening in La Vista is visible all across the City. And there are more developments coming. This season, as fall's vibrant colors begin to appear, I encourage you to take time to pause and look closely at the exciting changes and growth happening around you as we continue to build and invest in our City.

A LOOK AT LA VISTA'S FUTURE: TWO INTEGRAL UPCOMING BALLOT QUESTIONS



La Vista voters will face two important issues this fall during the Nov. 8, 2022, General Election that will significantly impact the City's future.

Our community has set an unmatched pace in providing services and amenities to our residents. The City Council has established a positive climate for economic growth in La Vista, and the fruits of those efforts can be seen in the progress being made on marquee projects, including City Centre and the 84th Street corridor, the Nebraska MultiSport Complex and the Southport area.

None of the City's progress would have been possible without strategic financial planning, which includes a responsible approach to investing the City's tax revenues.

The two ballot questions before La Vista voters in the November 8 general election include continuation of the City's half-cent sales tax and replacement of the restaurant tax.



HALF-CENT SALES TAX CONTINUATION

Since its inception, the half-cent sales tax has provided over \$35 million for many public infrastructure projects, including the construction of and improvements to:

- All major four-lane roads
- La Vista Sports Complex parking areas
- Traffic signalizations
- Annual street resurfacing and sidewalk improvements

The half-cent sales tax is set to end in 2025 unless La Vista's voters choose to continue it. Voter approval of the half-cent sales tax would be a continuation of the existing tax customers currently pay on purchases inside city limits, which has been in effect since 1990.

On average, 90% of the business transactions in La Vista in 2021 involved visitors from outside the city limits (according to market studies).

If voters do not approve the continuation of the City's half-cent sales tax on November 8, alternative solutions such as service reductions or tax increases would need to be considered in order to pay for existing debt. The City Council would also have to determine which current and future projects to delay or cancel.

It is important to remember that voter approval for continuation of the City's half-cent sales tax would not be an increase from the current level collected in the City—it would be maintaining what exists. This half-cent sales tax has been in place since 1990 and was reappraised by La Vista voters for renewal in 2000 and 2010.

RESTAURANT TAX REPLACEMENT

In 2019, the City established a restaurant tax to help ensure its fiscal strength and address the challenges resulting from rapid growth.

The tax was initially established at the rate of 1.5%, which was expected to generate revenue amounts consistent with the statutory limit of \$700,000. After two years of collecting the tax, however, revenues exceeded this amount, collecting \$765,323 in FY20 and \$993,675 in FY21. The ordinance approved by the City Council required a review after two years. The review has identified the restaurant tax to be a potentially significant source of funding to help shoulder the burden of growth.

Due to the types of development currently underway in La Vista, the food, beverage and tourism business is expected to continue to grow, and the number of visitors will continue to increase. La Vista voters will be asked to remove the \$700,000 limit and continue the restaurant tax at a rate of 2.5% in order to share the cost of funding increased service demands and infrastructure repair and improvements with non-residents.

Recent market studies indicate that on average, 90% of the business transactions, including restaurants, is generated by non-residents eating and drinking at La Vista establishments.



In short, the lion's share of the sales tax and restaurant tax revenue is being generated by visitors from outside of La Vista—and these revenues enable the City to rely less on property taxes and share the burden of growth associated with development with non-residents who enjoy La Vista's amenities.

The City Council has been entrusted with planning La Vista's growth for future generations, and the current local outlook is bright despite sagging national economic conditions. The associated revenue that could be generated from the sales tax continuation and an amended restaurant tax will help offset additional costs of providing public services and public facilities.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK OPEN HOUSE & SAFETY TIPS

October is Fire Safety Month, and the Papillion Fire Department is planning some fun activities for Fire Prevention Week. Come tour the station at their open house, climb on the equipment, meet your firefighters and enjoy some snacks! For more info, call **402.339.8617**.

The Fire Department also provided these tips for families from the National Fire Protection Association:

Keep matches and lighters out of the reach of children, up high, preferably in a locked cabinet, and closely supervise children, making sure that they are kept away from other fire sources, including lit candles, cigarettes, bonfires, and stoves.

Make a home escape plan, know at least two ways out of every room, have an outside meeting place, practice your home fire drill, practice using different ways out and teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.

When it comes time to celebrate Halloween, make sure to choose a costume without long trailing fabric, make sure eye holes on masks are large enough to see out and provide a flashlight with your child's costume. Keep all decorations away from open flames and use battery operated lights in jack-o-lanterns.

When the weather turns cold this fall, be sure to keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment and keep a three-foot kid-free zone around open fires and space heaters. Remember to turn off portable heaters when leaving the room or going to bed and test your smoke alarms at least once a month.

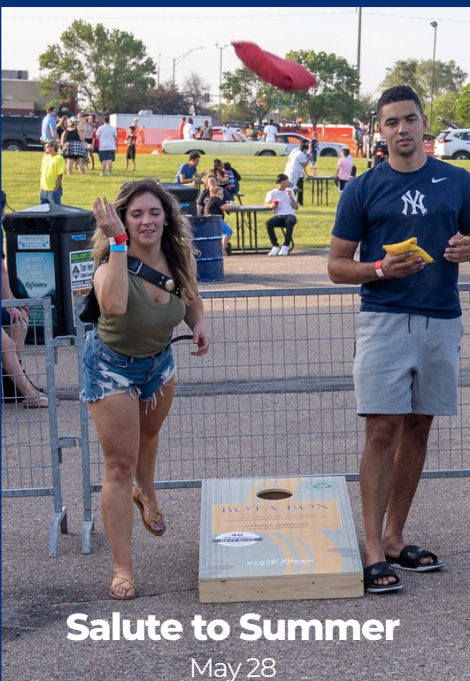

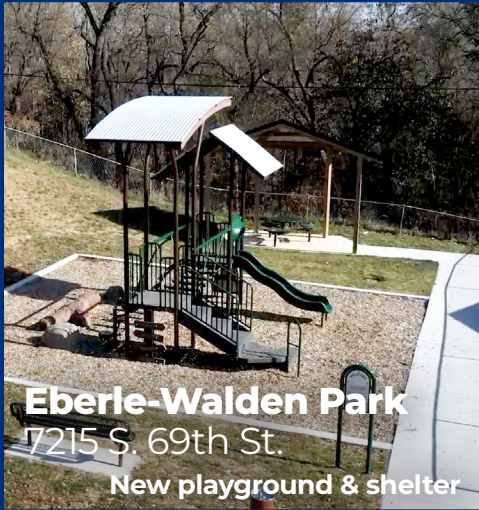

Central Park

Some of our park spaces have taken on new names around Central Park, and we wanted to remind the community of these new references. When events, programming and other announcements are published for these areas, the City will use these names, so here is a handy map to use and keep in mind for the future.



CENTRAL PARK EAST CONSTRUCTION

Central Park East has been a construction zone since this spring and work will continue in this area through the end of the year.



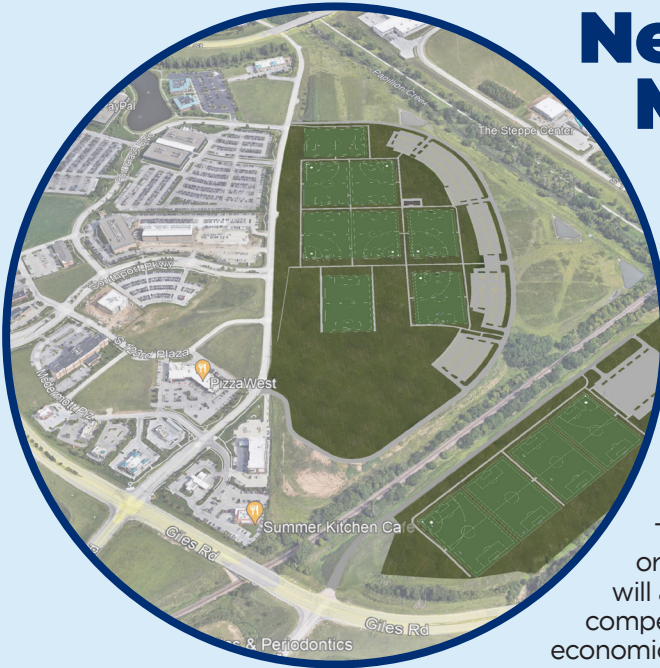
Crews continue to put the finishing touches on the Thompson Creek project in the park. The project improved and widened the creek channel to slow down storm water as it moves through the area. In addition, new trails were installed from Edgewood Boulevard to the west end of the park.

Although the project required the demolition of the restroom building, metal shelter and playground, the City has programmed funding for the replacement of these amenities in the next fiscal year, which begins in October. Exact placement and timing hasn't been determined yet, so stay tuned for more information.

The next phase of work in Central Park East will be the construction of an access road from Park View Boulevard to the City Centre fire access road. This will include the demolition of the pedestrian bridge and the installation of a box culvert over Thompson Creek. The project will provide safer access for delivery trucks going to The Astro music venue and The Link. Work began this summer and is expected to be complete by this winter.

The next phase of work in the park will be the replacement of the existing asphalt road in Central Park East. This work is anticipated to take place in the 2024 construction season.

A LOOK AROUND NEW DEVELOPMENTS



Nebraska MultiSport Complex

Anticipated to open this fall, the much anticipated Nebraska MultiSport Complex (NMSC) planned for the former sod farm near Giles Road and Eastport Parkway is under construction.

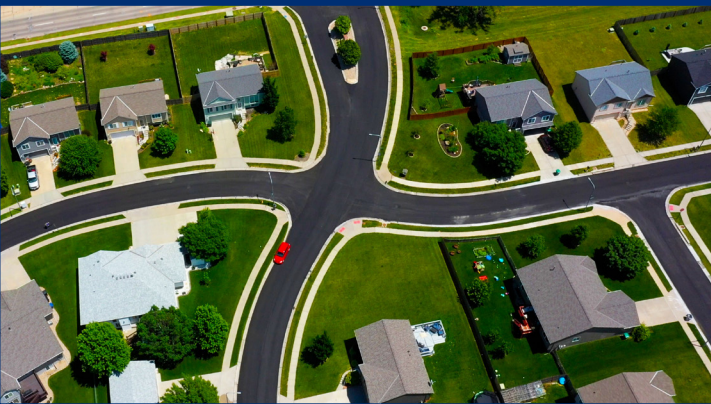
The complex's first phase, anticipated to be open this fall, will include 12 fields that will be home to several sports including soccer, fast-pitch softball, baseball, lacrosse, flag football and rugby. Several of the fields will be ready this fall with the rest complete by spring 2023.

The Complex is a private development by a non-profit organization and will not be a City facility. The facility will attract and host large-scale national, regional and local competitive events that will have significant and recurring economic impact for our community.

"This is exciting for the City of La Vista," said Mayor Douglas Kindig at a press conference in May. "The Nebraska MultiSport Complex will encourage economic development, growth and bring visitors to our City. We will have a significant increase in room nights and out of town visitors that will drive tourism development."

The NMSC applied for and received a \$3 million award from the City's Economic Development Program. They were also the recipient of a \$12.6 million Shovel-Ready Capital Recovery & Investment Grant award by the Nebraska Department of Economic Development. LIBRARY ROOF REPLACEMENT IS COMPLETE

Crews worked this spring and summer to replace the flat roof and gutter system at the La Vista Public Library and Metropolitan Community College Sarpy Center. The \$200,000 project was split between the college and the City, with the City paying \$100,000. The roof and gutter system was original to the building, which opened in 1997, and the project involved the replacement of the flat roof sections and underlying membrane as well as the gutter system.

GILES CORNER STREETS RESURFACED THIS SUMMER

The City's first use of a street maintenance method called the Ultra-Thin Bonded Asphalt System (UBAS) was applied in the Giles Corner neighborhood this summer.

The \$210,000 project included grinding the top half inch of concrete off of all the streets in the area followed by an asphalt layer over the remaining concrete.

This method is a key strategy in the City's Pavement Management Plan, which calls for being proactive in maintaining the community's good streets and working to fix the streets that have degraded in quality.

The UBAS method allows crews to grind up any imperfections and potential future structural deficiencies and seals the roadway with a new surface.

The City has budgeted \$500,000 for the same method to be used in the 2023 construction season in the area from 72nd Street to 78th Street between Harrison and Josephine, as well as another \$500,000 for other areas of the City in 2024.

- Please secure loads properly to prevent debris from obstructing the roads.

DUMPING DOS & DON'TS

ACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- Household and lawn furniture
- Mattresses and box springs
- Major appliances
- Grills and smokers
- Outdoor power equipment (please empty fuel prior to disposing)
- Residential construction materials
- Automotive parts and batteries
- Undamaged propane tanks
- Broken toys and play structures
- Bicycles
- Tree limbs and yard waste (must be free of garbage and bags)
- All types of TVs (rear projection, tube TVs, flat screens, etc. may be disposed of in the roll-off dumpsters)
- CRT computer monitors (may be disposed of in the roll-off dumpsters)

ELECTRONICS

The electronic recyclers will accept the following items in the designated area of the Cleanup Days site:

- Cassette tapes, CDs, and arcade games
- Computers (CRT monitors may be disposed of in the roll-off dumpsters). *Participants may request hard drives to be destroyed on site. The City of Papillion and its material recyclers are not responsible for loss of personal data.*

DOCUMENT SHREDDING

Please limit shreddable material to 10 file-size boxes per residence. Shredding is restricted to residential material only. Material must be free of binders, binder clips, or anything else that may damage the shredder. Shredding boxes will have to be taken back by the resident, but can be disposed of across the street at the Cleanup Days site.
