




CITY'S HISTORY REFLECTED IN NEW DEVELOPMENT

La Vista owes its very existence to the fortitude of families who chose to move here in late 1959 and 1960. They were lured by the prospect of finally owning a home, and they stayed because of the community they discovered in La Vista.



La Vista's first neighborhood of homes was 335 lots east of 72nd and Harrison streets and was developed by Don Decker and called The House of Nines, because the houses cost a total of \$9,999.

"It was Deckerville, it's a wonder they didn't call it that. The two streets that paralleled the creek were Easy Street North and Easy Street South," said former City Engineer Bob Dreessen. "The whole concept was that for \$9 down and \$99 a month, you too could live on Easy Street."

Decker would even substitute sweat equity for the down payment if the new owners would paint the interior of their homes.

As this community moves into the future with new opportunities and quality of life amenities, the City's history will be ever present when construction on The Link finishes next year. The Link will provide public restrooms, concession areas and outdoor event space that will be available for rent by the public. The project also includes public spaces around the music venue.



THE HOUSE OF IXs

A design feature of The Link is a repeating roman numeral nine on the concrete walls that line the lower level of the new park facility. The numbers will create an always-present reminder of La Vista's beginning.



COMMUNITY TABLE

Neighborhood parties were a regular occurrence in La Vista's early days, mostly because there wasn't much else to do. La Vistans had to invent their own fun as they didn't have the money to go out on the town. Families often made an evening outing at the local ballpark, and street dances and block parties were also common occurrences.

Above all else, the neighbors who were also friends came to be like family.

In honor of the community La Vista's first residents found in each other, another feature that will be added to the area around The Link will be a large community table, inspired by a photo from the City's history book showing a neighborhood gathering in someone's backyard in La Vista's early days.

"I always said we have family, but then we had this family," says Linda Filbrandt in the City's history book. "If you ever had a problem, you knew they were there for you."

PROJECT SLAM DUNK

La Vista's Jaycee Park transformed thanks to volunteers from Thrasher Foundation Repair.

The basketball court and surrounding landscaping at La Vista's Jaycee Park received some love from a generous local business this summer. A team of volunteers from Thrasher Foundation Repair adopted Jaycee Park as part of a volunteer project it dubbed "Project Slam Dunk." Drawing inspiration from Nike and the work the company does to revitalize outdoor basketball courts, Thrasher's team poured nine months into planning its project. The plan included repairing and painting the basketball court, replacing the nets on the basketball hoops, adding to the park's landscaping and making other needed updates. The result is a winning transformation for our community to enjoy.

Kyla Bayne, Thrasher's Marketing Event Coordinator, explained that one of Thrasher's core values is "One Community." Bayne said that means "returning the blessings that we've been given."

"We had the idea to adopt a park and paint a basketball court, and we searched through a bunch of parks in the area," said Bayne. "When we stopped by here, it was the perfect area right by our community—right in the heart of it—and it was a really good space."



Thrasher's volunteers worked closely with the City of La Vista's Recreation and Public Works departments to come up with a design for the basketball court that is consistent with La Vista's brand. Bayne pointed out that the design came naturally because the City's colors "really match the Thrasher colors and the geometric shape. So, we kind of merged everything together."

Employees from Thrasher's marketing and customer care teams began working in the park in July, contributing several workdays to the project. During that time, they got some assistance from another area business: Mulhall's.

"We're really lucky to have a great partnership with Mulhall's," said Bayne. "They were able to come out here as well and plant some really cool things and donate some really fun little areas to the park."

We're thankful for Thrasher's vision and the volunteers from both Thrasher Foundation Repair and Mulhall's for changing our viewpoint on Jaycee Park.

FORMER CITY COUNCILMEMBER MIKE CRAWFORD HONORED FOR SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY

The City of La Vista hosted a reception recently to celebrate the service of longtime City Council member Mike Crawford, who had to resign earlier this year due to health concerns. The reception was a chance for Crawford to reunite with the City's elected officials and staff, who he served with for many years.



A ROAD TRIP TO REMEMBER

This August, the La Vista Senior Center took a group of 45 seniors on an unforgettable adventure.

The group traveled far outside of La Vista on a daytrip to the Iowa State Fair in Des Moines.

Kaily Stanley, La Vista's Senior Services Manager, helped organize the excursion. Stanley explained that the idea for a trip came from seniors who frequent the Center. She said the City had designated funds for a signature senior program.

LA VISTA COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT TEAM RECOGNIZED AT NEBRASKA PLANNING CONFERENCE

Two members of the City's Community Development team recently received awards at the 2022 Annual Nebraska Planning Conference.



Cale Brodersen, Assistant Planner, received the Emerging Practicing Planner of the Year Award from Nebraska's chapter of the American Planning Association (APA). This award recognizes an individual with seven or fewer years of planning experience who demonstrates an exceptional commitment and understanding towards the planning profession.

Cale has worked as the Assistant Planner for the City of La Vista since his graduation with a Master's in Community and Regional Planning from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 2019.

In addition to volunteering on multiple City employee committees, Cale volunteers extensively within the Nebraska chapter of the APA and Nebraska Planning and Zoning Association. He serves as a newsletter co-editor, manages a book club for professionals, created a mentorship program and heads the Emerging Planners Networking Group.



Jeff Sinnott, Chief Building Official, received the Carol Swayne Planning Commissioner Award from the Nebraska Planning and Zoning Association. This award is for "Excellence in Planning" by a Planning Commissioner. While Jeff's primary area of expertise is in building permit review and inspection, he has a long history in planning and zoning. In 1974, he became a member of the La Vista Planning Commission and served for four years. He's also served in a planning and zoning role for the City of Plattsmouth, and he currently serves on the City of Ralston's Planning Commission.

Jeff has been employed with the City for 25 years and has assisted with La Vista's planning and zoning while in the role of Chief Building Official (prior to La Vista's hiring of a dedicated City Planner) since 1997.

WINTER DRIVING SAFETY



Winter driving conditions can change rapidly in Nebraska, so it is important that you and your family are prepared as you take to the roads during inclement weather. The best advice is to stay home during storms and avoid driving, but if you need to go out, please follow these suggestions.

- Always wear your seatbelt.
- Keep your vehicle gassed up and in good working condition. Ensure wiper blades are functioning and top off windshield fluid.
- Check the weather and traffic report (or your weather app) before heading out driving.
- Allow extra time for travel during the winter and do not drive faster than road conditions allow.
- Do not pass snowplows or sanding trucks. Plow drivers have limited visibility and you're likely to find the road in front of them worse than the road behind.
- Do not drive beyond your vehicle's capabilities. Even vehicles with 4-wheel drive can encounter issues on snow or ice-covered roadways.
- Stock your vehicle with the supplies you need to drive safely in the winter and stay warm in an emergency, including:
 - Snow shovel
 - Sand or cat litter
(*in case your vehicle becomes stuck in snow*)
 - Warm jackets, blankets, hats & gloves (*in case you must exit your vehicle*)
 - Ice scraper/broom
 - Flashlight
 - Jumper cables
 - Phone charger
 - Warning devices (*i.e. strobes, emergency markers*)

For longer trips, consider packing food, water and any medication you might need if stranded. If you become stranded or your vehicle breaks down:

- Stay with your vehicle.
- Do not overexert yourself.
- Place bright markers on the antenna or windows.
- Keep the interior dome light turned on.
- Do not run your car for long periods of time while the windows are rolled up or in an enclosed space—this is a carbon monoxide hazard. If you must keep your vehicle running to stay warm, clear snow away from the exhaust pipe.



PROTECT HOLIDAY PACKAGES FROM GRINCHES

The holiday season is a time of giving. Sadly, some grinches look for opportunities during the holidays to take what isn't theirs. Package theft has become more common thanks to the popularity of online shopping — and porch pirates are becoming increasingly bold. Video doorbells and security cameras can record thieves in action, but these devices don't always prevent theft.

To avoid becoming an easy target, take precautions when you shop online to keep your packages out of thieves' hands. We suggest:

- Selecting "ship to store" at checkout when shopping online from retailers that have stores near your home or work.
- Having orders delivered to shipping stores (UPS, FedEx, etc.) that will hold your packages until you can retrieve them.
- Using secure delivery lockers. (Amazon, etc.)
- Requesting "signature required" delivery so purchases are not left unattended at your home.
- Watching for delivery status updates in your inbox and keeping track of when your items are out for delivery.
- Teaming up with neighbors and asking someone you trust to watch for and retrieve packages when you aren't home.

Remember to always keep your porch well lit, and don't hesitate to report suspicious activity to the Police Department.

BIENNIAL BUDGET

HIGHLIGHTS

The spending plan of \$67.9M in FY23 and \$47.9M in FY24 for all funds in the FY23-FY24 Biennial Budget continues the City's commitment to delivering quality municipal services, investing in public infrastructure and opportunities to improve the economy, and ensuring long-term financial stability.

Growth management significantly influenced development of the budget based on two primary drivers. The population, which is expected to increase by 20% over the next decade and daytime population, which will continue to evolve as new development occurs. These factors will have immediate impact on city services related to public safety calls for service, traffic management, parking enforcement, snow removal, park maintenance, parking facility operations and maintenance, etc.


Major expenses pertain to personnel, equipment and infrastructure improvements. New positions include the following additions: (3) police officers; (1) police sergeant; (1) landscape gardener; (1) maintenance worker (1) administrative assistant (Library); PT – seasonal workers and recreation attendants. Infrastructure investment is highlighted on page 10.

GENERAL FUND

The General Fund is the City's main operating fund. It pays for the majority of the day-to-day services and programs that keep La Vista running. Property and sales taxes are the largest General Fund revenue sources.

GENERAL FUND REVENUE SOURCES

Multiple revenue sources sustain La Vista's General Fund.

PROPERTY TAX – \$11.9M

For every \$100 in property valuation, the City receives \$.54. The **General Fund** receives \$.50. (*An additional \$.04 goes to the Debt Service Fund.*) The majority of your property taxes support local schools.

SALES TAX – \$4.9M

For every \$100 in purchases made, residents, businesses and visitors pay \$7.50 in sales tax. The majority of the sales tax, \$5.50, benefits the State, while the City receives approximately \$2. The **General Fund** receives \$1, and, as approved by voters, \$.50 goes to both the Redevelopment Fund for 84th Street and the Debt Service Fund for streets and other infrastructure.

OTHER – \$2.2M

Revenue categories less than \$1M are combined in Other. These categories include Occupation & Franchise Taxes, Interest Income, Recreation Fees, Special Services, Grant Income, Parking Garage Fees, Permits & Licensing and Miscellaneous.

INTER-GOVERNMENTAL – \$2.1M

The City receives a distribution from the State of Nebraska of Highway Allocation revenue, which includes fuel taxes and other motor vehicle fees from the State.

RESTAURANT TAX – \$2.1M*

Restaurants and drinking places pay a monthly occupation tax equal to 1.5% of gross prepared food and beverage receipts.

*This number will be amended to \$700K.

HOTEL TAX – \$1M

Hotels pay a monthly occupation tax equal to 5% of gross receipts from room rentals.

A STRONG FINANCIAL POSITION



La Vista's overall financial condition is strong. The City continues to maintain an Aa3 bond rating, which demonstrates high quality and very low credit risk, while pursuing new development.



WHAT'S IN YOUR WALLET?

Hopefully you answered, "A library card!" Library Card Sign-up Month has been held each September since 1987 to mark the beginning of the school year. If you missed getting a card in September, don't worry—you can get one any time the La Vista Public Library is open.

To get a La Vista Library card, stop by the Library and sign up! Library cards are issued to adults 16 and older, and minor children ages 5-15 with parental consent. If you are a La Vista resident, meaning you live within the legal limits of La Vista, the taxes you pay to the City already pay for your Library membership. This is your tax dollars at work!

You are eligible for a La Vista Public Library card at no charge if you meet any of these requirements:

- Reside within the city limits of La Vista (including any apartment complex within the legal city limits)
- Own your own business in La Vista
- Active-duty military residing in Sarpy County
- Current Metropolitan Community College student, faculty member or staff person
- Teach within the city limits of La Vista

Non-residents who do not meet the above criteria can still sign up and pay for a La Vista Public Library membership. The fee is \$60 annually.

When signing up for your card, bring your driver's license or state issued I.D. card with your La Vista address on it. If you are active military, MCC student, faculty or staff, or teaching, bring your I.D. for verification. New to the area and don't have your state I.D. yet? A utility bill with your name and La Vista address works, too.

To verify whether or not you live within the legal limits of La Vista, call or e-mail the Library or visit the City's website at CityofLaVista.org/AmIAResident.

Explore the Night Sky with Your Library Card

Did you know you can borrow a telescope from the Library? It's as easy as checking out a book. Thanks to a partnership with the Omaha Astronomical Society, Library cardholders (with a good standing account and at least three continuous months of membership) can check out an easy-to-use, high-quality telescope with a user guide and star maps. The telescope can be checked out for two weeks at a time. Whether you're a first-time stargazer or an astronomy buff, ask about the telescope on your next trip to the Library.



Video Magnifier for Visual Assistance

Through a partnership between the Nebraska Library Commission and the Nebraska Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired, the Library is able to offer a new portable video magnifier to help visually impaired users read books, newspapers, and other materials.

This resource is easy to use, has a variety of settings for different viewing options and is available whenever the Library is open. Staff can answer questions and provide assistance as needed.

WINTER SEASON REMINDERS

Snowy weather will soon be here, and the Public Works Department has a couple of reminders regarding clearing snow from streets and sidewalks.

SNOW EMERGENCY

When a snow emergency is declared, local media outlets (radio and newspaper) will be notified and notice will be posted on the City's social media accounts and website at CityofLaVista.org.

Citizens are required to keep all vehicles off the street after a snowstorm (at least 2 inches of accumulation) or after a declared snow emergency for 24 hours, or until the street has been plowed. Even if the vehicle was already parked on the street before the storm, it must be moved off the street for 24 hours after the storm ends or until the snowplows clear the street.

CLEARING SIDEWALKS

In all residential neighborhoods, sidewalks must be clear within 24 hours after precipitation ends. In all business districts, the property and public sidewalks must be clear within five hours of the end of the storm, or by 8:30 a.m. the next morning.



WORK IS UNDERWAY ON THE APPLEWOOD CREEK TRAIL PROJECT

The Applewood Creek Trail project will create a new 10-foot-wide recreational trail that runs north and south near 101st Street and connects to an existing trail in the area south of Giles Road.

Construction, which began in late August, focused initially on building the section of the new trail south of Giles Road and building the south half of a pedestrian underpass under Giles Road. Crews have also been constructing a portion of the trail between Giles Road and Brentwood Drive and intend to continue with trail work north of Brentwood Drive as weather allows.

If weather permits, work may continue over the winter, however, traffic is not expected to be significantly impacted. Construction will shift to the north half of the Giles Road in the spring, as well as any remaining trail work north of Brentwood Drive. At that time, traffic on Giles Road will be temporarily restricted while the second half of the pedestrian underpass is completed. The entire project is expected to be ready for the community's enjoyment by summer 2023.


A Tip to Ready Trees for Winter

Pruning trees in the late fall helps protect them from storms during the winter months. This time of year, identify and remove dead or sagging branches from trees on your property. They are the weakest link in a tree and the most likely to fall and cause damage to property or power lines during winter storms.

The City of La Vista's certified arborist, Dutch Sevener, explains there are certain things homeowners can look for in the shape and condition of their trees' branches to know if they are likely to come down in a strong storm. One is to be cautious of tree joints that form a tight "V" shape because they are more likely to snap under the weight of a storm.

Tree Ordinance Reminder

Make way for snowplows! The City's ordinance requires homeowners to keep all trees that hang over the street trimmed to allow 15 feet or more of overhead clearance. This makes it easier for plows to clear streets when it snows.

DUTCH'S VIEW OF LA VISTA

The City has grown a lot and added new trails, which keeps employees busy maintaining these new areas.

Maintaining the more than 2,000 trees across La Vista is a tall order. Leading the effort is long-time City employee, Dutch Sevener, who became a certified arborist five years ago. As part of his arborist certification process, Sevener attended training workshops to grow his knowledge of trees and tree care.

Sevener's classes covered topics ranging from tree identification to soil to tree care. He explained that tree diseases and treatments were a particular area of focus because "one disease can easily look like another."

Sevener's training serves him well when caring for the City's trees, however if he gets stumped, he turns to technology to expand his knowledge. "I myself don't own a cell phone, so when I get home, I get on my iPad and look stuff up."

Park Superintendent, Jason Allen, explains that having an arborist on staff supports La Vista's Tree City USA designation. He says Sevener's expertise is invaluable and helps the City protect its investment in its trees and the benefits they provide.

"Dutch's expertise in trimming, tree removal, the safety of it, the knowledge of tree species (how they're supposed to be maintained and cared for) is what that arborist license brings to us in the City. It's very valuable."

AN IMPROVED PLAYING EXPERIENCE AT THE LA VISTA SPORTS COMPLEX

If you spent any time playing or watching sports at the La Vista Sports Complex this fall, you may have noticed the impact of a new mowing pattern the City adopted.

The La Vista Sports Complex on the far eastern end of the community has been a hive of athletic activity for more than three decades. A recent change to the height of the grass on the playing fields has resulted in a nice change of pace for teams that play there.

Aaron Johannsen is the foreman at the La Vista Sports Complex, which encompasses nearly 70 acres with 14 soccer fields and five mixed use baseball/softball fields. Last fall, Johannsen and the maintenance team made a change to how they mow the grass playing surfaces at the complex.

Crews now mow the soccer fields to an inch and three-eighths compared to three inches, shaving off more than an inch and a quarter of grass on each field. The baseball fields are now kept at a two-inch height. As a result, the pace of games has increased significantly.

"It's been quite the change of speed. We are actually watching the ball roll instead of hitting the grass and stopping," Johannsen said. "It's kind of fascinating to me, and I know the players enjoy it, too."

With a shorter playing surface, when a soccer ball gets kicked or a baseball/softball gets hit into the grass, it has less resistance and rolls farther. Players can make plays without the ball stopping and them having to go to it.

"It changes the playing experience, and it also changes our growth. With our increased mowing frequency and shorter height, the plant itself likes to try and push recovery all the time. Our grass grows a little more, and we're getting more sustained growth throughout the year."

Johannsen said he has received positive feedback from both players and coaches. He explained that other than

needing fuel more often, nothing else has changed to the maintenance operations at the Sports Complex to make this improvement possible.

"I know what turf can be, and I know what turf can do, so I want to push its limits," Johannsen explained. "We've had pretty great results as far as the fields standing up to traffic, and the overall experience has increased. It really has been a change for the better."
